SUNRICE has no current plans for the Coleambally rice mill despite announcing the reopening of the Deniliquin mill this week.

SunRice chairman Gerry While Lawson said a strong crop forecast had led to the announcement, a company spokesperson said it was too early in the season to predict how much rice will be produced across the region and decisions about the Coleambally mill could not be made "at this early stage"

"The rice planting period has not concluded and can continue through to mid to late November. It is too early to predict how much rice will be produced in Coleambally and across the whole industry. Decisions about rice receival, processing and employment cannot be made at this early stage," the spokesperson "Based on early predictions

SunRice is confident the stronger crop warrants the opening of the Deniliquin Mill in addition to the Leeton Mill.

Coleambally Irrigation chairman and rice grower Trent Gardiner said the reopening of mills across the region showed great confidence in the revival of the local industry and he was confident in the decisions being made by the SunRice board.

'It doesn't really make any difference to Coleambally rice growers because our receivals are still open but it shows the season is back on track and it does inspire more confidence in the farmers,' Mr Gardiner said. "I believe the board is acting in the best interest of the business as a whole and I have confidence in the decisions they are making.

"I just hope the good season continues." But Murrumbidgee shire general manager Paul Goodsall said the Deniliquin mill reopening was a positive sign for

Coleambally residents with the reopening of their mill a possibility in the future.

'They haven't contacted council at this stage but it does give us some hope that the Coleambally mill might open somewhere down the track," he said. "I heard some people say the other day they would need 850,000 tonnes to consider reopening Coly and they've predicted 800,000 tonnes for this coming harvest.

"There's obviously not enough at this stage and I wouldn't imagine they would open it up unless it had a reasonable lifespan but all we can do is wait and see, hopefully Coly will be next.

While many people lost their jobs and moved away from the region when the Coleambally mill shut down, Mr Goodsall said reopening it had the potential to bring people back to the shire and build up communities that had been suffering under the drought for the past

from the passenger seat and into the middle of the roadway.

She was killed instantly while her 22-year-old granddaughter, Ria Bhardwaj, was rushed to Leeton Hospital but pronounced dead on arrival.

Another passenger, 24-year-old Monika Bhardwaj, suffered severe spinal injuries and was later airlifted to Sydney's Royal North Shore Hospital, where she remains in a critical condi-

The driver and only occupant of the Toyota four-wheel-drive, a Leeton man in his 60s, and the driver of the Holden Commodore were uninjured but treated for shock at Griffith Base Hospital.

Griffith Police Inspector Gordon Dunlop was one of the first on the scene.

"Here we have yet another horrific crash in the Riverina and it's simply a tragedy for all concerned," Insp Dunlop said.

"It's another reminder that people must be extra vigilant at all times when they're behind the

Police closed off the road in both directions from about 6.15pm Saturday until 3am the next morning.

The vehicles were removed by crane while traffic was diverted around the scene.

Local detectives and crime scene investigators from Albury attended and a brief is being prepared for the coroner, with police saying charges were possible.

The tragedy comes just days after the death of Griffith man Jan Butland, a local high school casual teacher who died when his car collided with a tree near Darlington Point on Thursday.
